About Singapore



Singapore Island was originally inhabited by fishermen and pirates and served as an outpost for the Sumatran empire of Srīvijaya. According to Javanese inscriptions and Chinese records dating back to the 14th century, the island was known as Tumasik, or Temasek (Javanese for 'sea').

By the end of the 14th century, Temasek had fallen into decay and was taken over by Malacca (now Melaka, Malaysia).

There are a few stories as to how the city got its name. It is believed that Rajendra could have been the one that named the city 'Singapura' (Lion City) or the name may have been bestowed in the 14th century by Buddhist monks, to whom the lion was symbolic. According to a Malay chronicle the city was founded by the Srīvijayan prince Sri Tri Buana. It is said that he caught a glimpse of a tiger which he mistook for a lion and thus the name 'Singapura'.

In 1819 Stamford Raffles working with the English East India Company landed at Singapore. He was told by the chief (who was a subordinate of his cousin Abdul Rahman, who was under Dutch surveillance) that the company could purchase land. Raffles withdrew his recognition of Abdul Rahman and installed his older brother Hussein in order to validate the purchase of the land, thereby offending the Dutch, who protested. No action was taken against Raffles.

An Anglo-Dutch treaty in 1824 left Malaya and Singapore in the British sphere. In 1826 Singapore, Penang and Malacca (Melaka) were combined to become the 'Straits Settlements' and formed part of an outlying residency of India.

In 1830 they were reduced to a residency under Bengal and Singapore became the capital.

In 1833 the East India Company lost its foothold of the China trade and thus its monopoly and it followed that they lost their interests in Malaya. The governor-general of India took over direct control in 1851 and in 1867 they were declared to be a crown colony under the Colonial Office in London.

In 1963 Singapore joined the Federation of Malaysia but seceded in 1965 at the invitation of the Malaysian government due to economic and political differences between state and central governments that led to great tension. Relations between Singapore and Malaysia continued to be affected until the mid 1970's after which relations became more cordial.


British military presence ended in Singapore in 1971 and a five-power defence arrangement between Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore and Malaysia came into force. Diplomatic relations with Singapore's neighbours improved in the 21st century and there were less territorial disputes and reduced concerns over transportation access and water supply.

In 2010 China and six ASEAN countries including Singapore established a largely tariff-free trade zone in the region.

Tourism plays a vital role in Singapore's economy and makes up 3-4% of its annual GDP. It further ensures job creation and the liveability for locals as well as playing a role in reinforcing Singapore as a vibrant city that is global and attractive to capital, business and talent.






Gardens by the Bay












Gravel Pequirements

Immigration Requirements



- i) Passport Validity
 - · Have minimum 6-month passport validity if you are not a Singapore passport holder
- ii) Visa
 - Short-Term travellers holding a passport or travel document from a visa-required country/region must apply for a Visa
 - Visa-required travellers can use the <u>Visa-Free Transit Facility</u> for stay of less than 96 hours in Singapore, if eligible

iii) SG Arrival Card (SGAC)

- All travellers are required to <u>submit the SG Arrival Card</u> within three (3) days (including the day of arrival) before arriving in Singapore, except:
 - Those transiting/transferring through Singapore without seeking immigration clearance; and
 - Singapore citizens, Permanent Residents and Long-Term Pass Holders entering via land checkpoints.

Submission of SGAC is Free and can be done via the <u>SGAC e-Service</u> or <u>MyICA Mobile app</u>. Travellers who fail to submit SGAC may be denied entry into Singapore.

For more information on SGAC submission, refer to SGAC with Electronic Health Declaration.

Prohibited & Controlled Goods

Prohibited items are not allowed to be imported into Singapore. These include:

- Chewing gum
- Chewing tobacco and imitation tobacco products (for example, electronic cigarettes/vapes)
- Controlled drugs and psychotropic substances
- Obscene articles, publications, videotapes, videodiscs and software
- Reproductions of copyright publications, videotapes, videodiscs and laser discs, records and cassettes
- Seditious and treasonable materials.




Rabbit
